Star Fighters

Do you have what it takes to become an Intergalactic Force cadet? Fire up student's enthusiasm for reading and writing as they explore the hazards of space, meet the crew of the Phoenix and recreate a gripping scene from the books. Perfect for getting reluctant and struggling readers motivated to tackle the books as well as exciting advanced readers about the possibilities for their own writing. Assembly includes five book prizes and free bookmarks.

Audience: Key Stage 2

Timings: 45 mins – 1 hour

The Magic Portal

The Power of stories and how I became a writer.

My journey to becoming an author started off with learning to read and stepping through the magic portal into a new world. I talk about the school reading scheme that got me hooked and explore what goes on inside a writer's mind. Pupils get to ask lots of questions and excited about writing their own stories!

Audience: Key Stage 1 and older Timings: 30 mins

Writing Workshops

With writing, the possibilities for workshops are endless – they can cover almost any topic or any aspect of literacy. These are just some of the workshops I've used in schools – I'm continually reviewing and adapting my lesson plans, as well as adding new ideas to keep them fresh. I've worked from Reception through to Year 6. A minimum of 40 mins with each class is needed, but longer sessions are ideal to take the work further.

Taking a Story for a Walk

Writers of any age often struggle to take an idea or 'what if' and create an exciting story with plenty of twists and turns. As a class, we'll take an idea for a walk and explore strategies to create further ideas that we can incorporate in a story. We can then plan and write our own stories.

Character Creation

Characters are the living heart of any narrative. This session helps students start to create and discover their own characters, as well as learn tools that they can use in other writing situations.

Goodies V Baddies

Conflict is at the centre of any story. This session helps students to invent their own hero and villain, and then create a story where their two characters are pitted against each other.

The Writer's Toolkit

We all have a writer's toolkit filled with strategies and experience. This thought provoking session explores the myths and truths about writers and writing – with a few exercises and thoughts that help young writers feel more confident the next time they sit down to write.

The "Book in a Week" Writer-in-Residence Project – Working with either the whole school, or a couple of classes, students are challenged to invent, plan, write and illustrate a story in a week. I've run this residency twice with the results often surprising teachers! Contact me to find out more.
